COVID-19: Pulse of WA metrix **





In the news this fortnight:

- Local COVID case numbers peaked near 10,000 cases a day
- · Further restrictions were eased, with venue capacity increased and no more limitations on West Australians gathering at home
- · Global tensions and supply chain pressures continue to drive up the cost of living



Community Concerns

While COVID remains an issue, cost of living dominates current concerns.

Updates on current restrictions is the most commonly sought information, though many still seek updates on case numbers and hospitalisations.

Compared to the height of COVID in 2020, West Australians are experiencing more worry, frustration and anxiety.

COVID-19 Concern

Despite facing significant community transmission for the first time in two years, concern is lower than at the start of the first wave in 2020 (86%). Concern is highest among those 55+ (74%).



Changing behaviours

Since the community spread of COVID West Aussies have changed their behaviour. They are less likely to...



Take part in physical greetings



50% Go out to



Visit public places



Spend on non-essential items



Most West Australians indicate they are not in a hurry to travel overseas, though those under 55 are more likely to plan an overseas trip in the next 12 months. Despite open borders, intentions to travel within WA remain strong.
